I. Background CPWP

Since 2005, the Committee to Promote Women in Politics (CPWP) has been committed to promoting women's equal participation and representation in public office. We are comprised of seven core member organizations. They are: Gender and Development Cambodia (GADC), Committee for Free & Fair Elections in Cambodia (COMFREL), Neutral & Impartial Committee for Free & Fair Elections in Cambodia (NICFEC), Women Media Center (WMC), PADEK, DPA, SILAKA. CPWP also has four associate members (KWWA, Strey Khmer, CAFDOC and AMARA). CPWP has been active in enhancing women's participation and representation in politics with a focus on strengthening the capacity of women leaders as well as a collective effort to do lobby and advocacy. Our current strategic plan (2012 - 2015) is 1) renewing and strengthens grassroots empowerment, 2) working with local women leaders, 3) staying engage with the public in what we do, 4) building knowledge networking, and advocating. Lately, CPWP has worked to include young women activists in our core target groups at the provinces. Target groups are in 15 districts in 10 provinces: Kampong Chham, Kampong Thom, Prey Veng, Kg Chhnang, Kandal, Kratie, Takeo, Mondulkiri, Thboung Khmom and Stung Treng. Claiming Rights for Ours Sisters (CROS) partnered with Oxfam in the implement of this project. SILAKA was the host agency of the CPWP project activities since from 2005 to 2012 and again since October 2014.

The project goal is to contribute to the improvement of women's human rights through the collaboration among different stakeholders in increasing women representation at the decision making level. Therefore, this project wants to deeply analyze the barriers that block women to meaningful participants in decision making in term of accessing government budget at the subnational level.

II. Rational

Almost 10 years experiences working with women both at the national and sub-national level, we found out that discriminatory laws and practices withhold women from equal representation in positions of power and leadership. Regarding to those discrimination, women leaders especially at sub-national faced difficulty to get disbursement of funds for services at the communes and sangkats level, and for Consultative Committee for Women and Children to

monitor district authorities activities; budget transfers often were late and in some areas, do not come at all. These issues really affect the response in short and long term solution to the needs of women and children at the local level. The government commitments to women and gender equality have led to a number of areas of progress for Cambodia women. However, the interpretation of those commitments into action and real implementation still remain a gap to address the need of women and –girls on the ground.

Under the fund support from Oxfam, CPWP have conducted research on "Challenges of Women Leaders in Accessing National Fund for Women and Children at the Sub-national level" in 4 provinces, Kampong Tom, Kandal, Battambong and Ratanakiri. We have interviewed female leaders, 2 each from members of Provinces, districts and commune councils, in total 24 female leaders in combination with the desk research and stakeholders interview. This research can therefore be seen as ground-braking and will be used as tool to advocate for real, long-lasting change, as it provides foundation for government, National Assembly, civil society, academic, media to hold each other accountable to achieve gender equality.

III. Objectives:

- 1. Sharing the research result to informed the realities and of the needs on the ground;
- 2. Identify the priority issues to take immediate and long term action;
- 3. Collaboration from different stakeholders to ensure that policy and government's commitment are translated into tangible actions with actual budget.

- 1. Policy makers and other relevant stakeholder well informed of the real issues and challenges at the ground level regarding to accessing national budget;
- 2. Keys action points that different stake holders can contribute for effective policy on gender equality.
